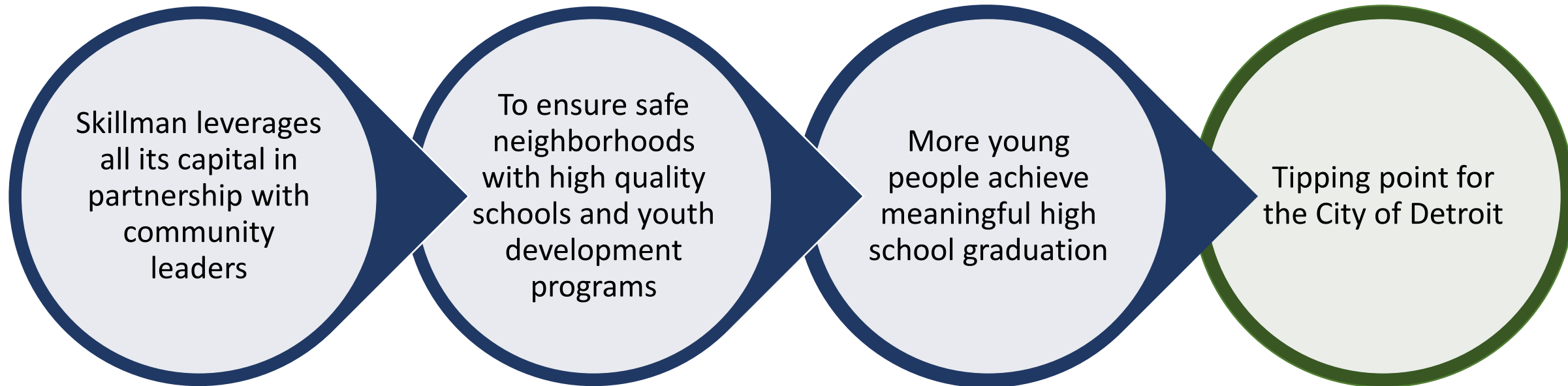

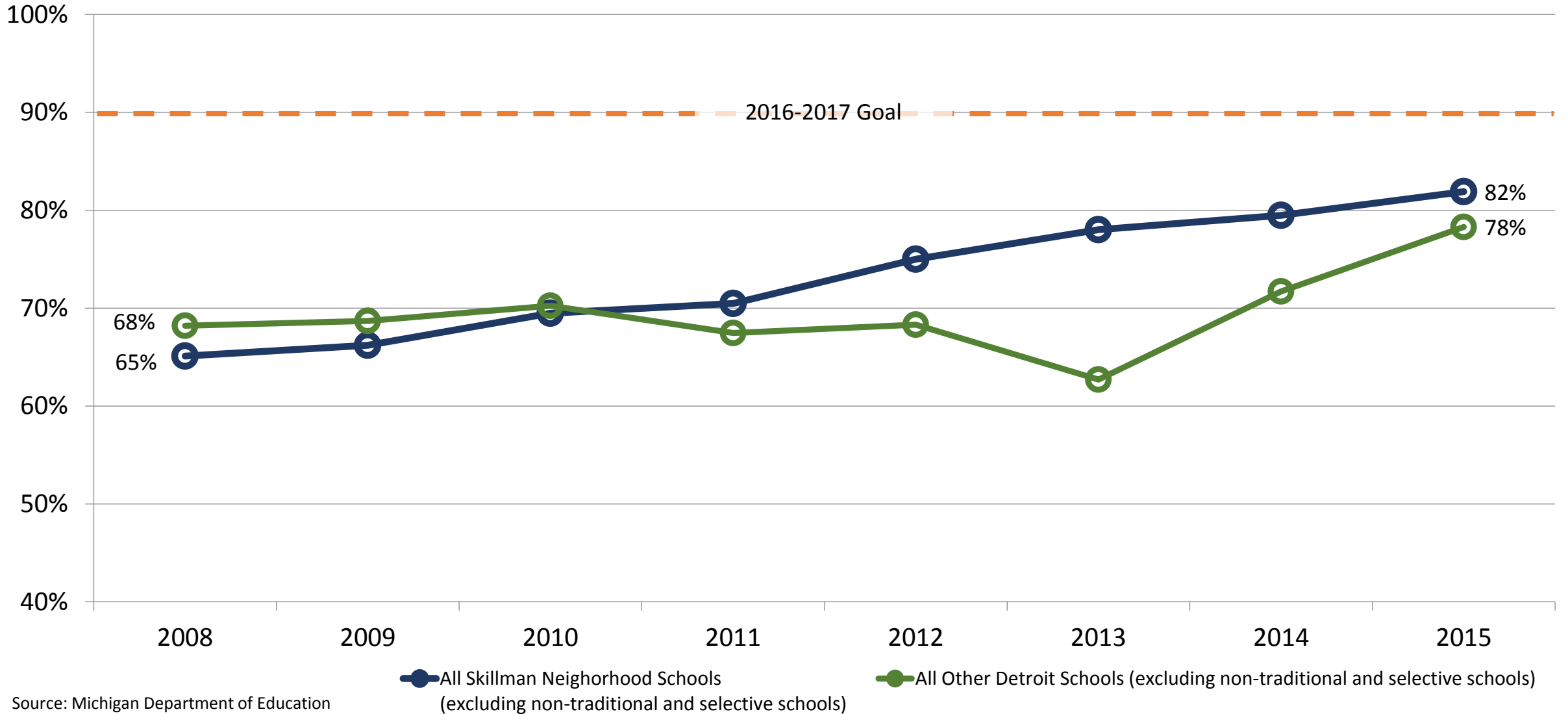


Skillman's Enterprise Level Theory of Change



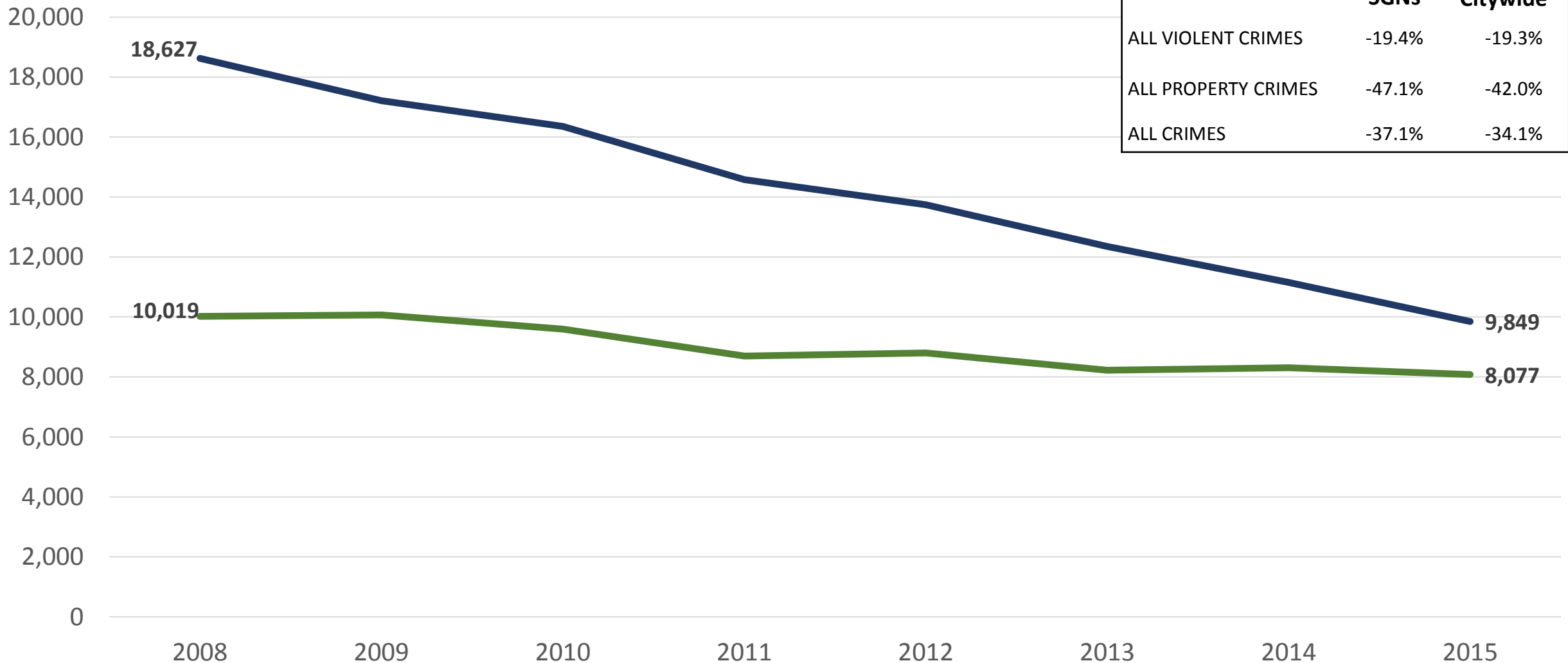

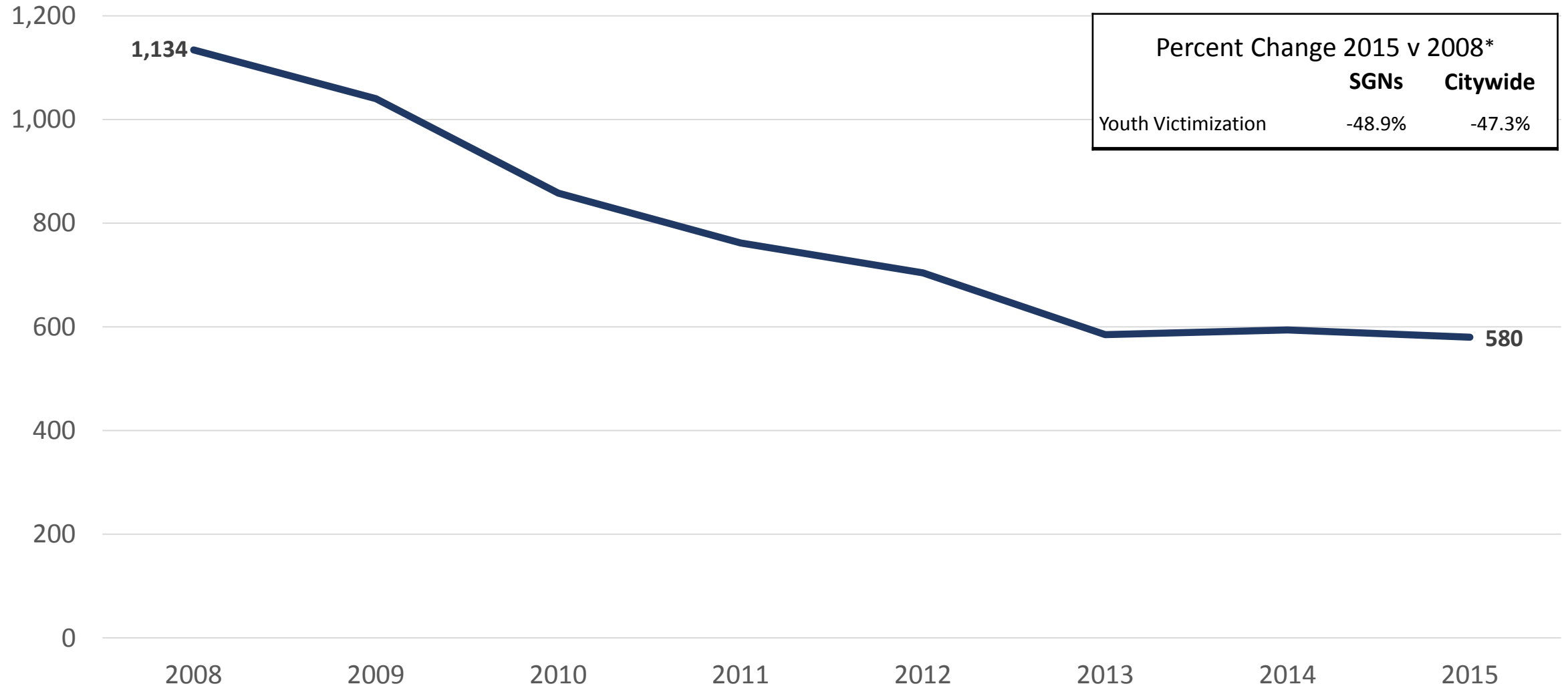
Violent and Property Crimes

Number of Incidents in Skillman Good Neighborhoods



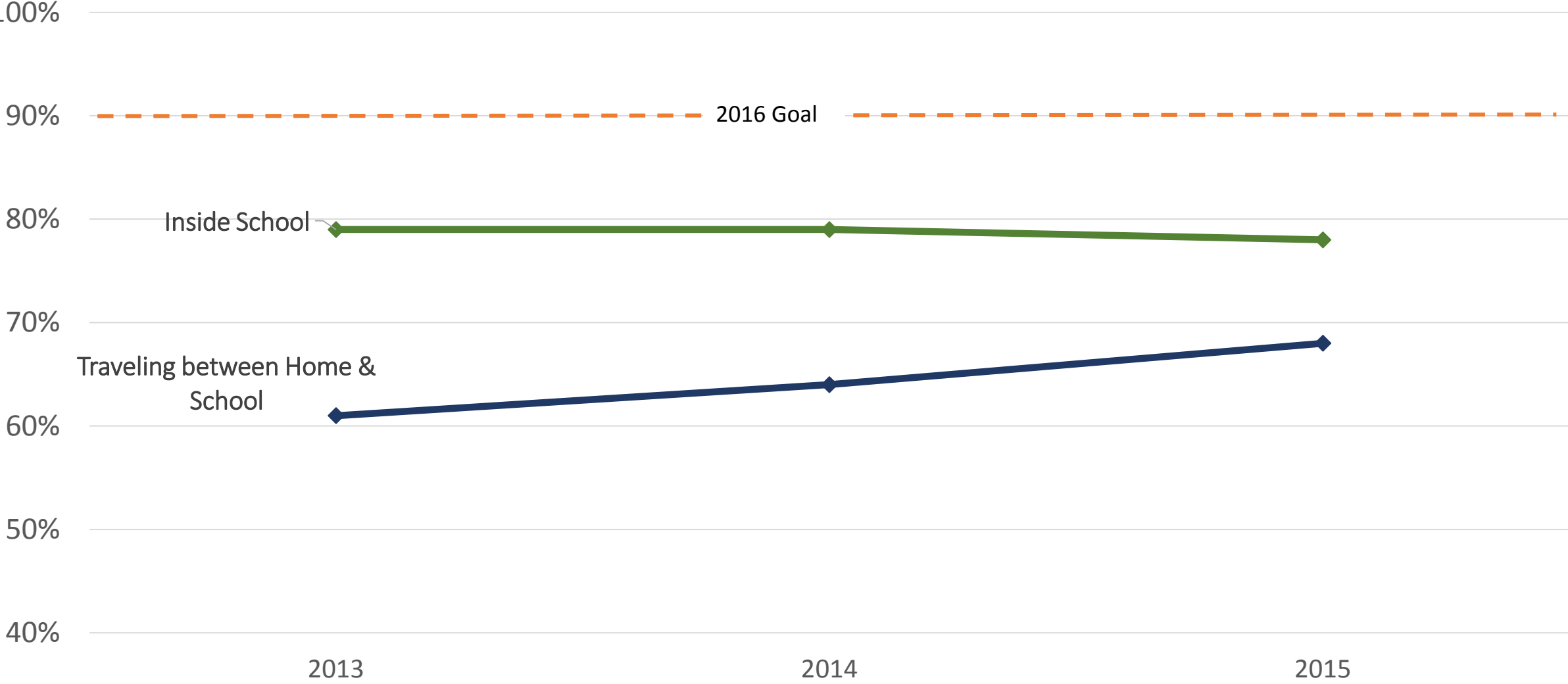
Youth Victimization in Violent Crimes (17 & under)

Percent of Skillman Good Neighborhood Youth (14-18 Year Olds) in employment opportunities



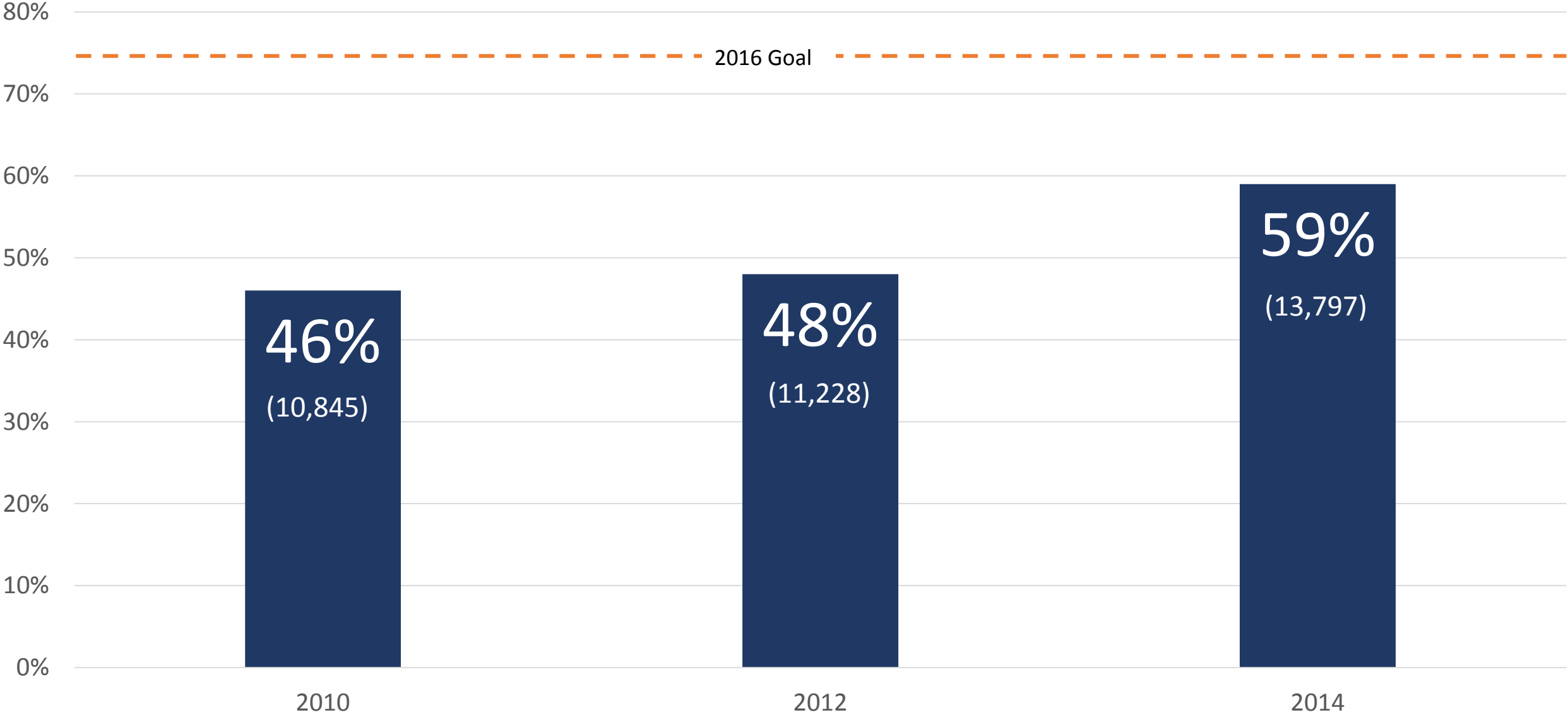

Percent of Skillman Good Neighborhood Youth (11-18 Year Olds) Served

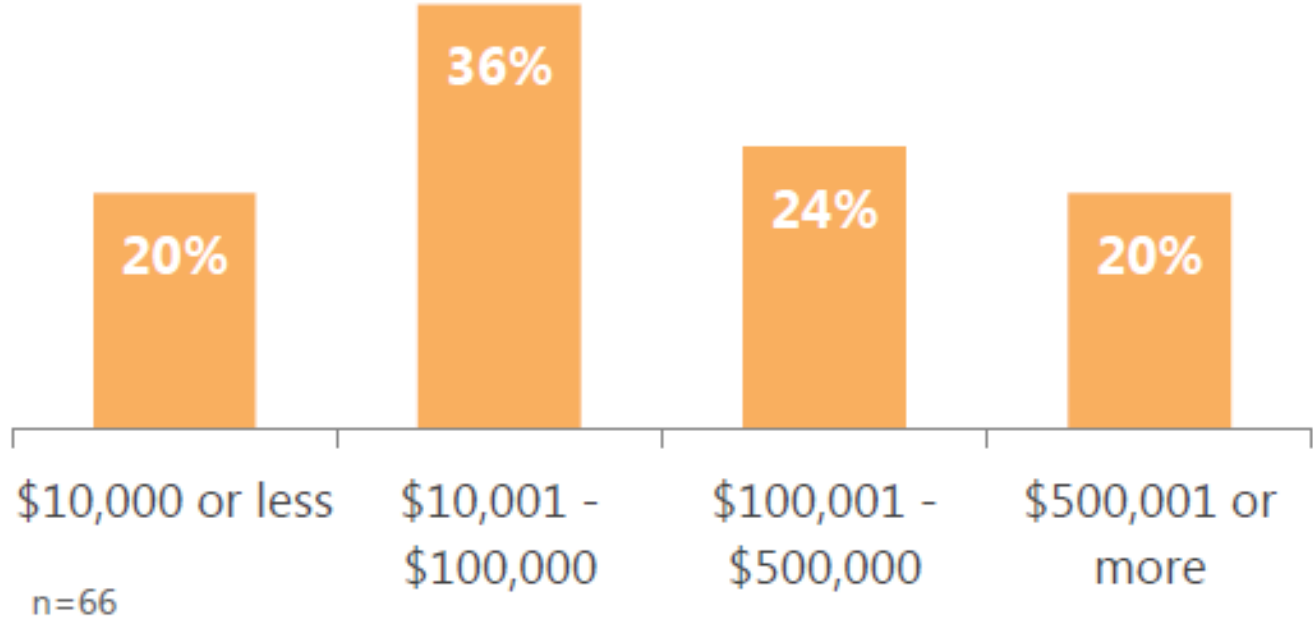

Why is program budget size important?

The size of youth development program budgets gives a sense of the level of resources that providers can access as they seek to create high-quality programs and to offer enough slots to meet the local need.

How big are agencies' youth development program budgets?

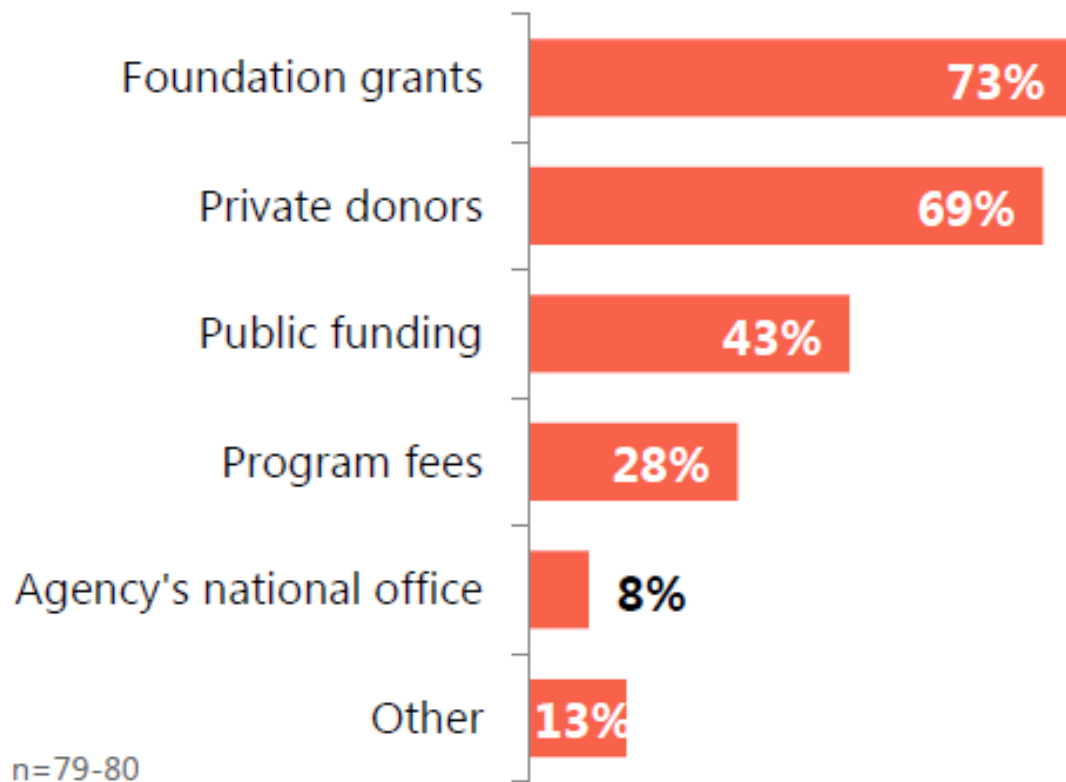

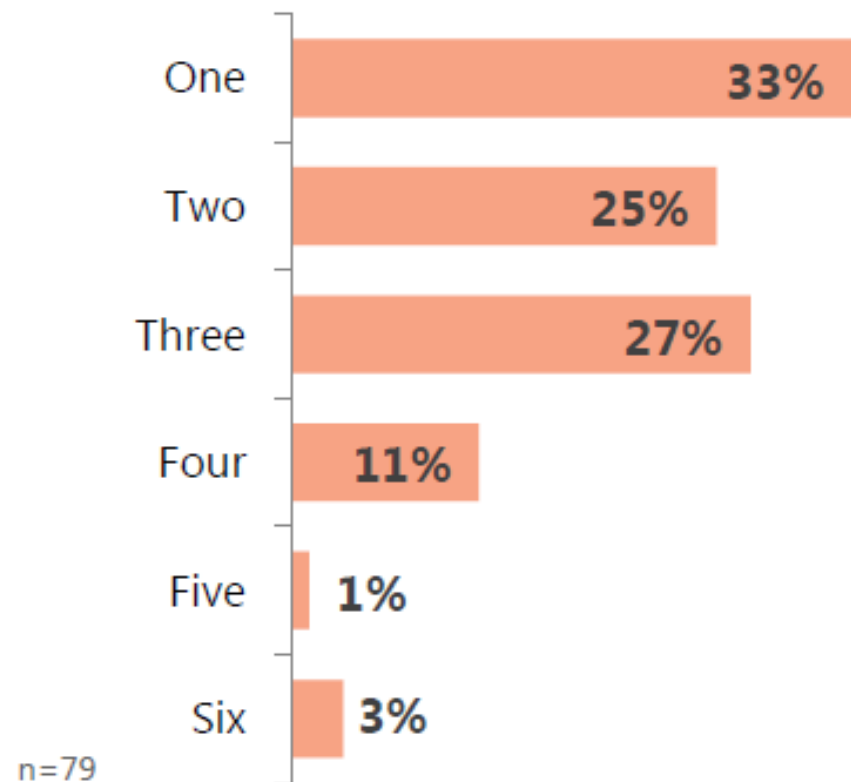
Why is funding diversity important?

The level of funding diversity indicates the extent to which programs as a whole are sustainable (programs tend to be more sustainable when they can depend on multiple types of funding – public v. private, etc.). Narrowing the focus to the diversity of foundation funding allows a look at the degree to which youth development providers depend on the Skillman Foundation in particular.

There were **1,628** active GN leaders (unduplicated) across the four neighborhoods

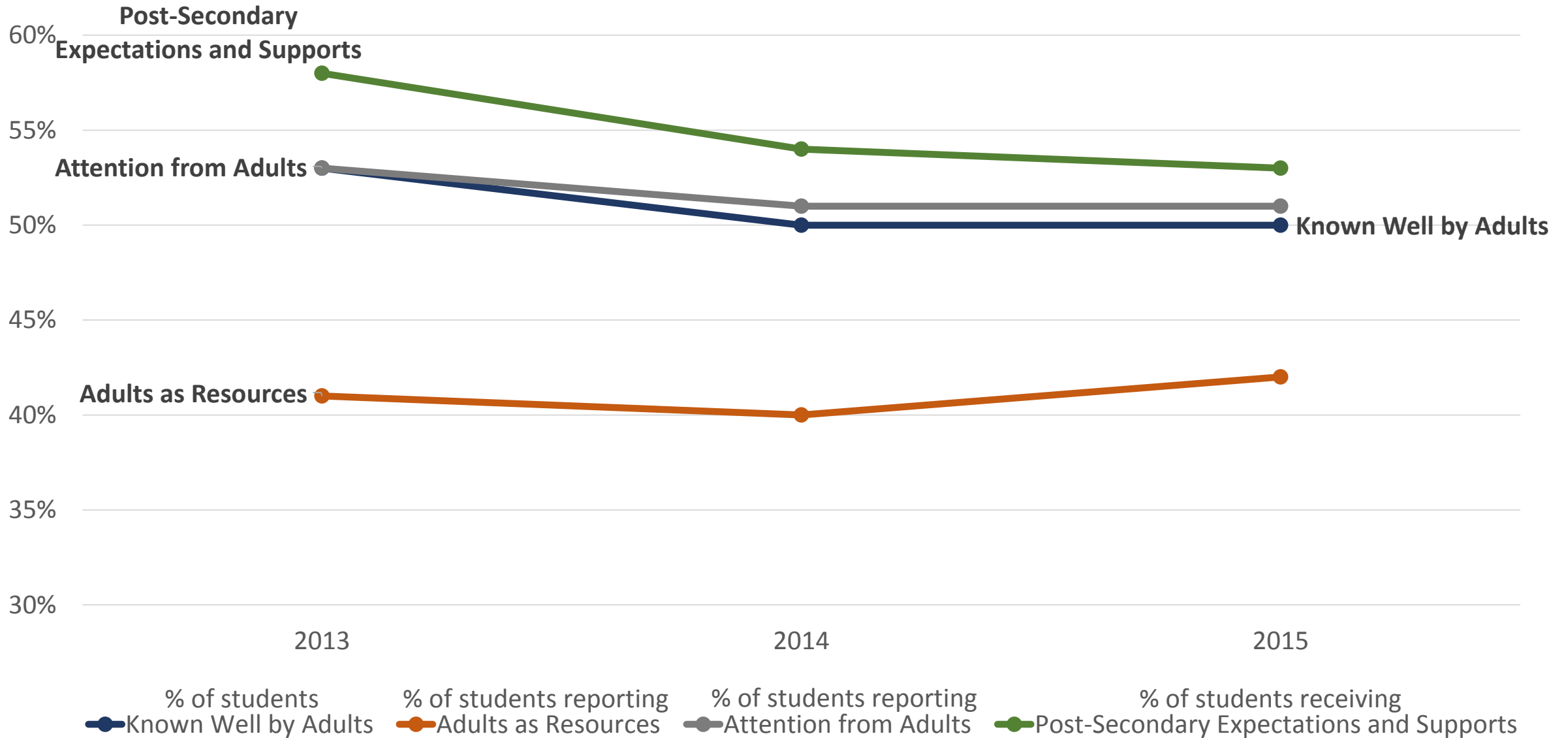

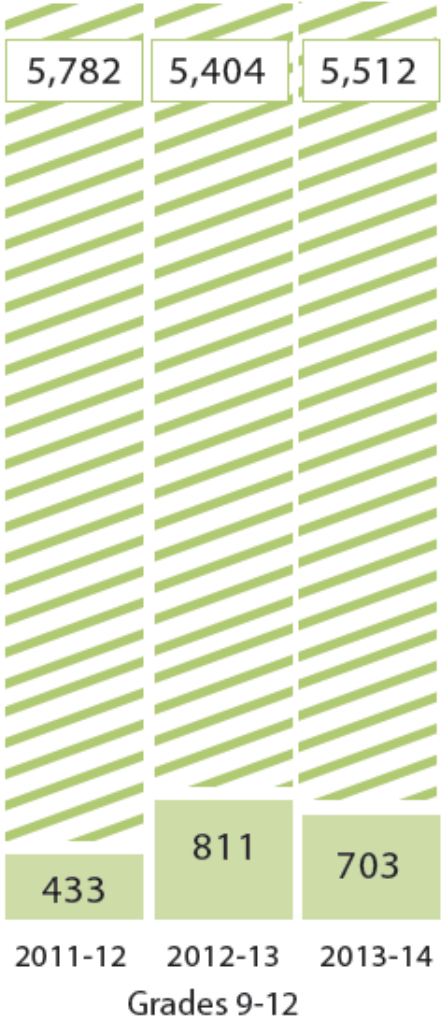
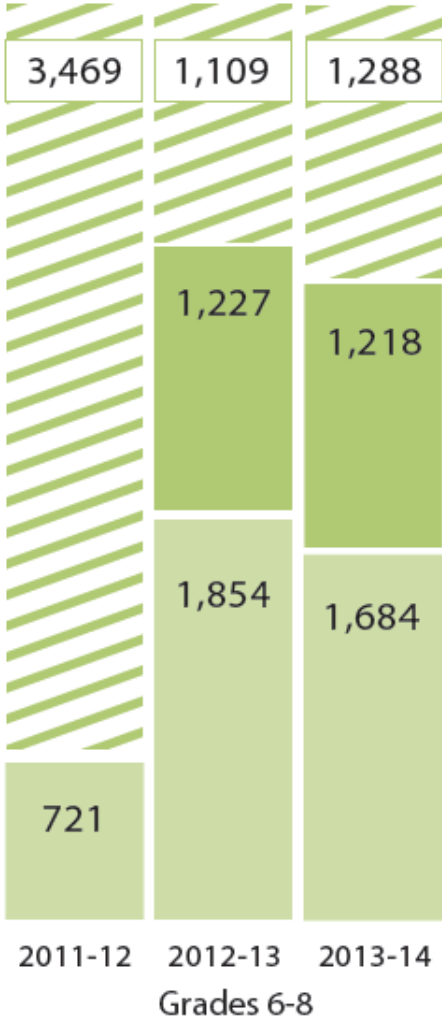
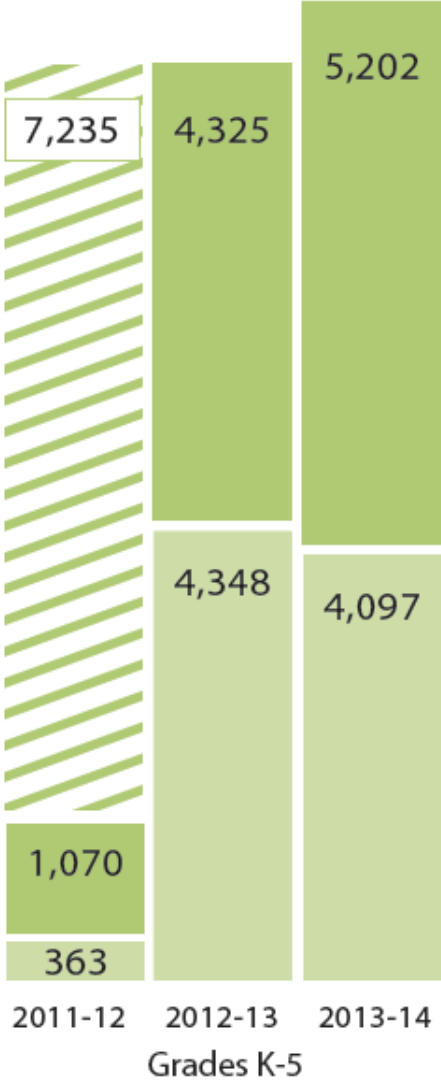

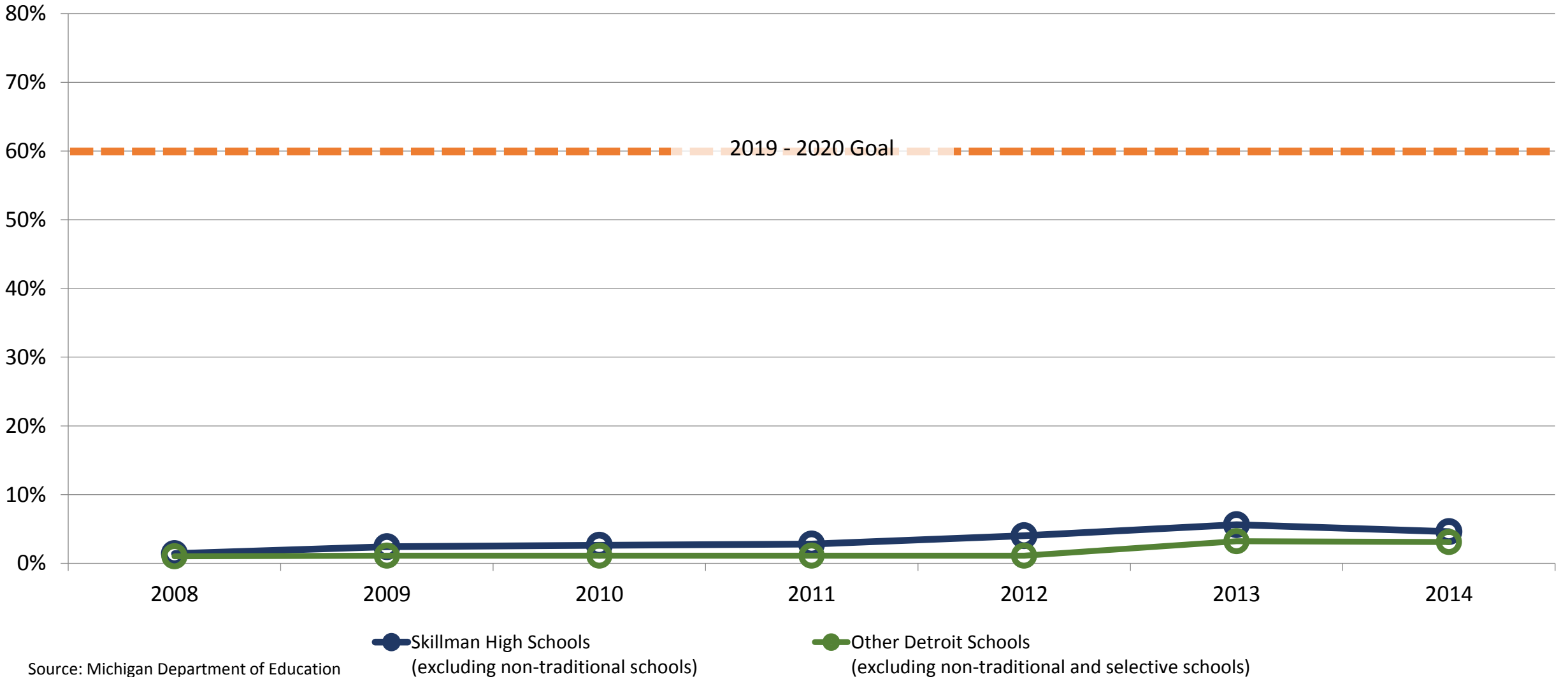

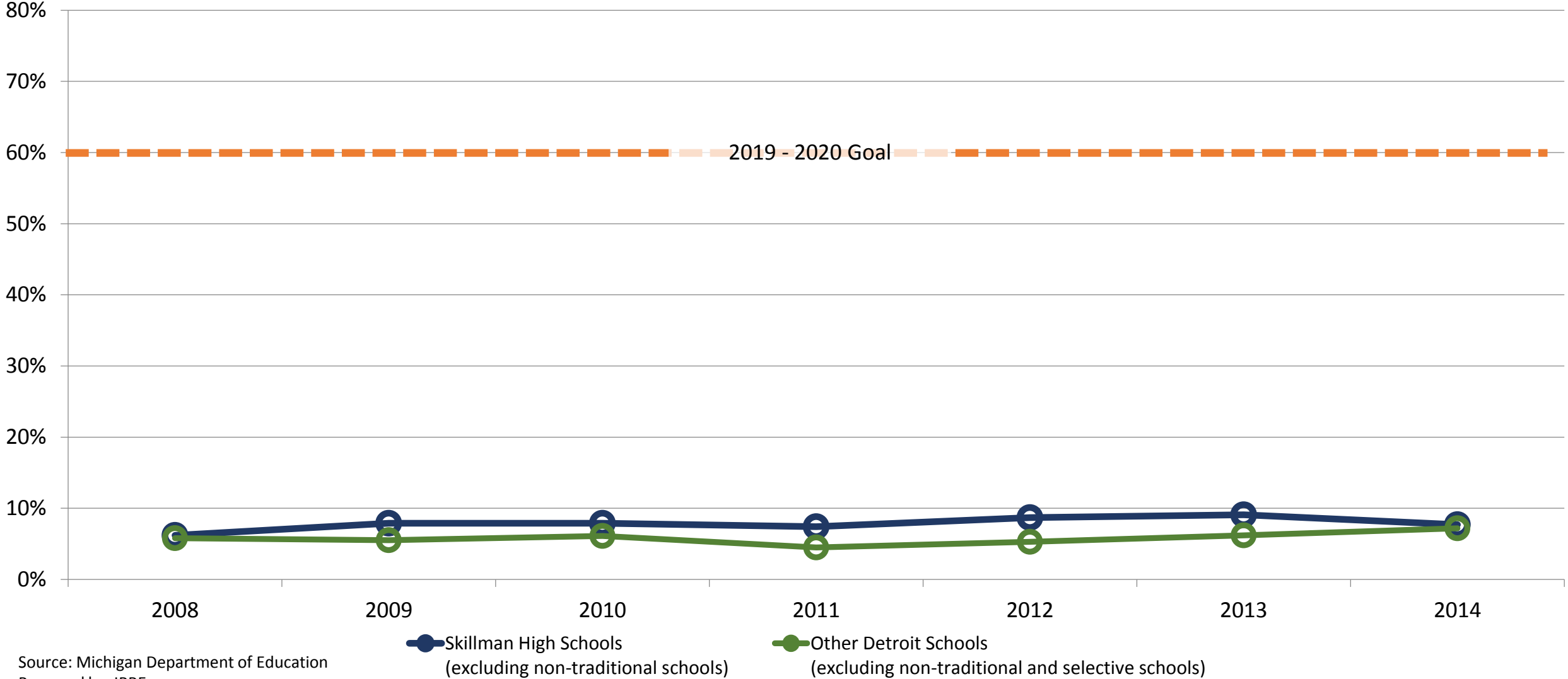
Students Achieving College-Readiness Benchmarks

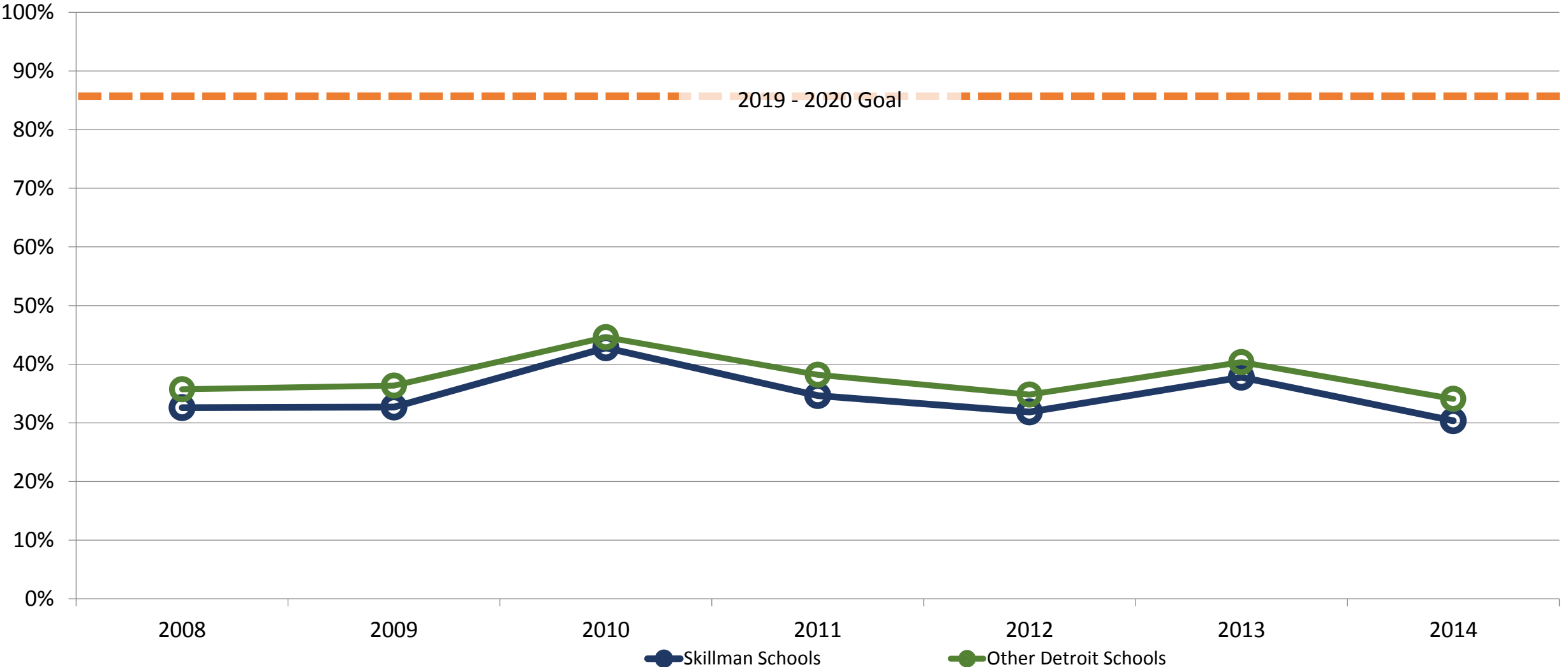

Students Scoring Proficient or Better

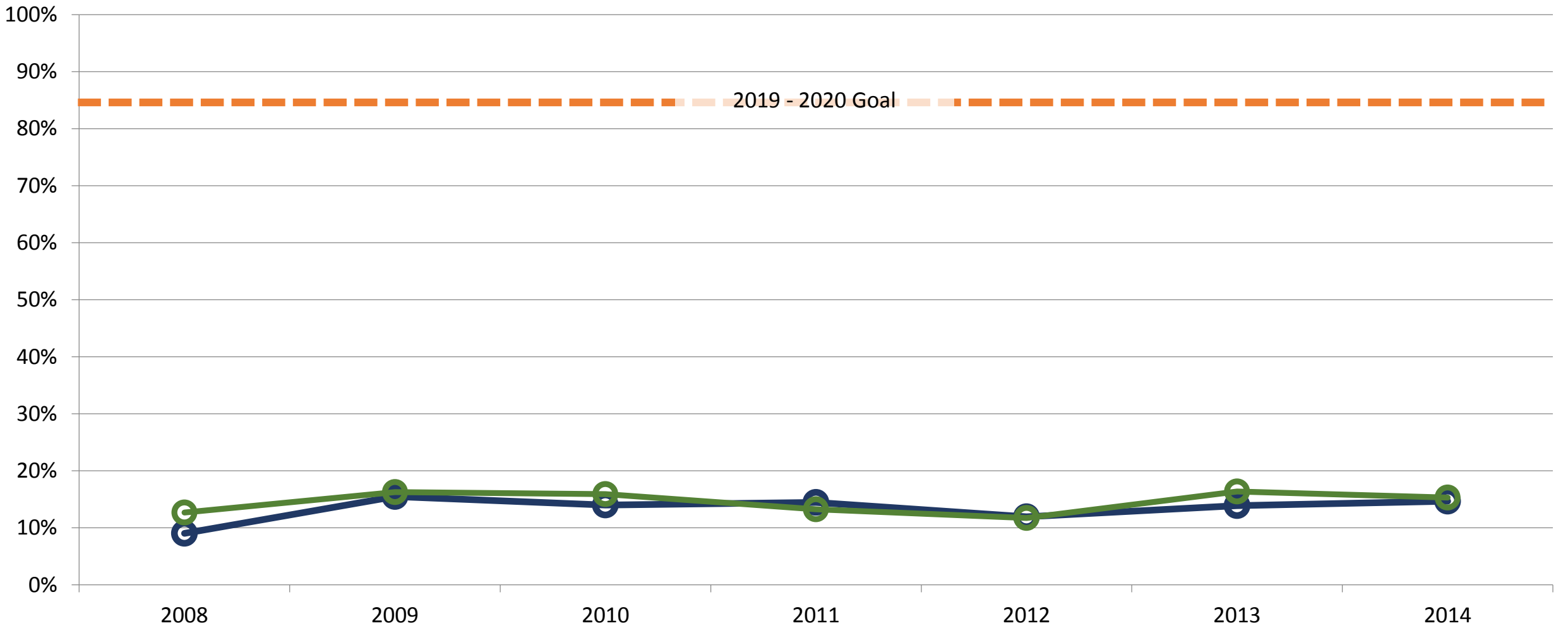
Skillman Good Neighborhood and Other Detroit Elementary Schools

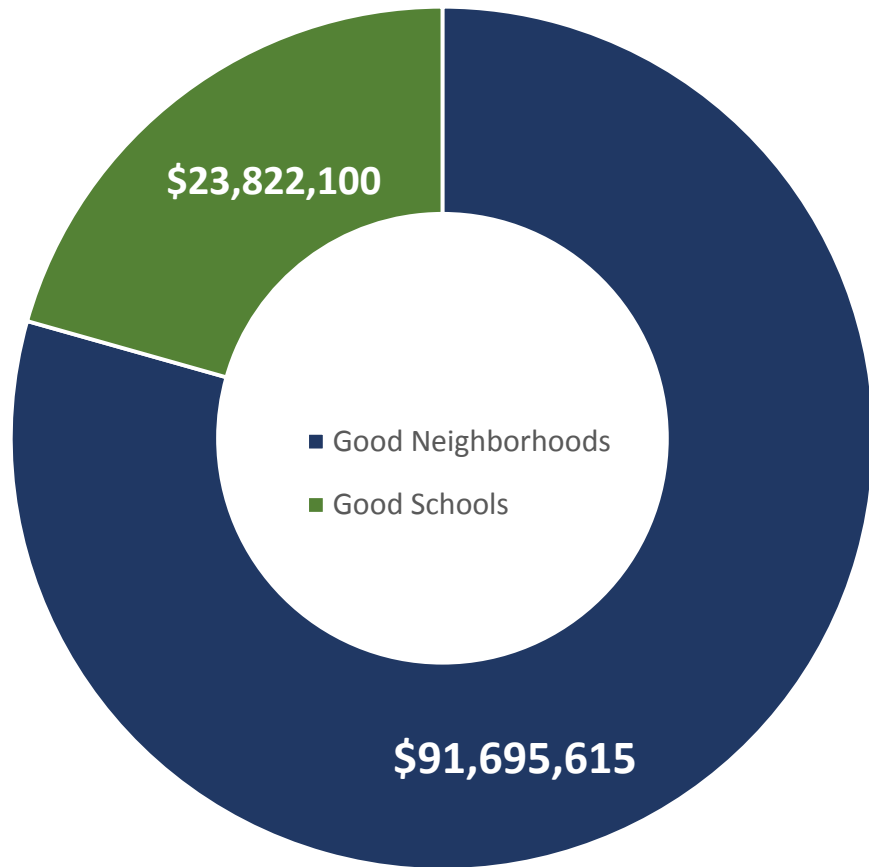

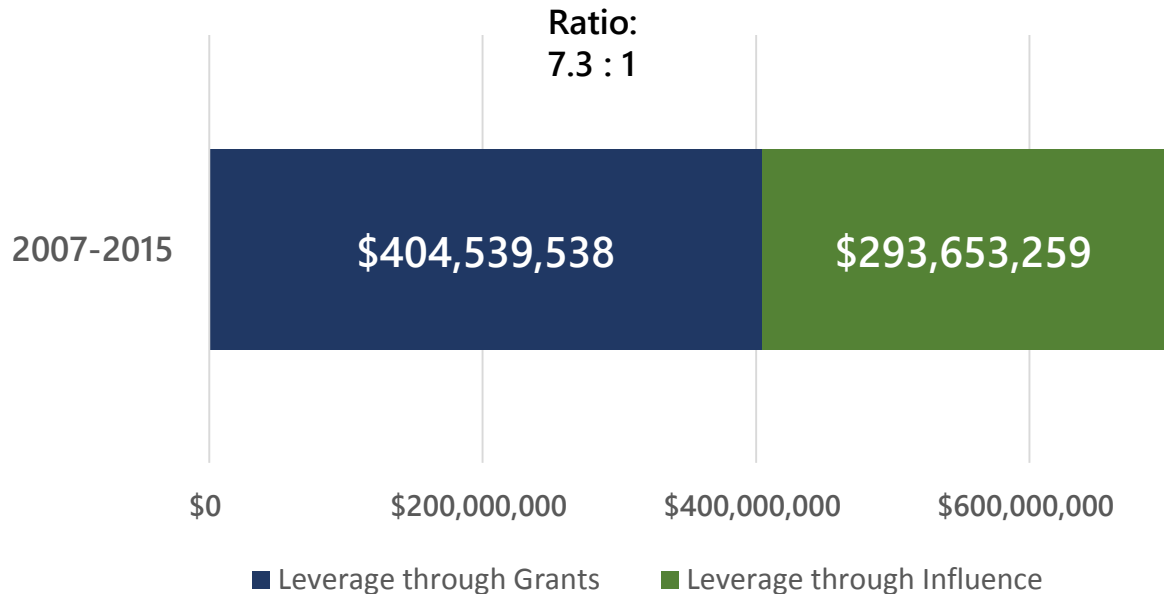

In 2006, The Skillman Foundation committed to investing **\$100 million** and leveraging investments at a **5:1 ratio** in **six** Detroit neighborhoods **over 10 years**

Over \$115 Million invested into the Skillman Good Neighborhoods since 2006
(Under Good Neighborhoods and Good Schools Initiative)



Nearly \$700 Million leveraged into the Skillman Good Neighborhoods since 2007
(Leverage through Grants and Influence)



About Leverage:

The Foundation collects information on leverage created through its grant dollars, and through its influence in the community. Data from staff, grantees, and partners are collected and compiled annually to provide insight into how our work attracts broader resources to target neighborhoods and projects.
